### Co-Pastors' Corner...



It was an "aha" moment for many in the room. On Ash Wednesday, as we began our "Walking in Faith" Feed Your Soul study, I asked who could name the marks of discipleship we spent much time discussing a year or more ago. The collective memory of those gathered easily recalled 5 marks—prayer, worship, Bible reading, service, and giving—but not a single person could remember what the missing sixth mark was. "Is it 'share your faith?'" That was close, but not exactly it. Here is the exact wording on our wallet cards: Be in RELATIONSHIP to encourage spiritual growth in others.

Of course, this doesn't mean that no one in the room was living this "mark" of discipleship. What it indicates, however, is that we need more intentionality about our spiritual relationships, or else we might forget why we gather to share faith.

We gather, in pairs, in small groups, and in larger groups, to share faith because none of us can walk the way of Jesus Christ alone. We get together to share our burdens, our joys, our hopes, and our needs. We share our faith stories because when we do, we discover that we are not the only ones to struggle with doubts and fears. We learn from one another how to speak our hearts, to voice our questions, and to claim our relationship with the God who claims us.

That is how we grow in faith, and encourage others to grow in faith, too. The faith stories we have heard on Wednesday evenings (this continues through April 13, and is open to all) have been as individual as the individuals who have shared them. The "truth-telling" of these "testimonies" shows us that God is wonderfully creative and active in infinitely diverse ways—yet at the same time, we can make points of connection between our stories which draw us closer to one another and closer to God. Sometimes people fall into the trap of thinking that only trained pastors can speak of faith. This series has blown away that false idea.

Spiritual growth is for everyone, and no one can do it alone. Who are your spiritual companions and friends? Come to Feed Your Soul, join a fellowship group, seek out friends who will help you—and you can help them, too—to grow toward God. Relationships are God's gift to us all!

## Roxanne Fauque wins Yale Distinguished Music Educator Award

Every Sunday morning at 8:30, Roxanne Fauque and her husband Alan inspire our worship with their original arrangements and spirit-filled music. We know they are gifted because of the ways their music blesses us. Now Roxanne has been nationally recognized for her role as a music educator at Belgrade Intermediate School. Congratulations, Roxanne!

Following her nomination by Belgrade's Superintendent of Schools, Roxanne wrote essays and submitted videos to the Yale School of Music. She was chosen from among 330 nominees from 45 states. Her reward is an all-expenses paid symposium at Yale University in June, at which Yo-Yo Ma will be a featured presenter.

Roxanne has been a public school music teacher for 33 years. "You have to have energy all day long," she says. And we know she does!

## Holy Week offers many Worship Opportunities

The most sacred week of the Christian year will soon be here, the week which begins with palms, descends to death, and rises to celebrate the central affirmation of our faith—Christ is risen! Deepen your spiritual life by worshipping with your church family throughout Holy Week.

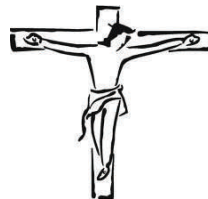
**Sunday, April 17 - Palm/Passion Sunday** On this day, we remember Jesus at the center of a parade entering Jerusalem, when the crowds waved palms and put down their cloaks for Him to ride His borrowed donkey across. On this day, we also prepare for the events of Jesus' final days, known in Christian tradition as the "Passion." Special worship highlights: palms carried in parade by children (10:30a); piano soloist Jiyao Li (10:30—see article p. 6)

**Thursday, April 21 - Maundy Thursday** On this day, we remember the last meal Jesus shared with His disciples in two ways—our traditional Seder dinner, held in the Fellowship Hall at 5:45p (see article p. 5) and our Maundy Thursday communion service, held in the sanctuary at 7p. The Worship Choir and First Bells will lead our remembrance of the supper at which Jesus told His followers, "Do this in remembrance of me."



**Friday, April 22 - Good Friday** On this day, we remember the death of our Lord Jesus Christ on a cross. It is the most solemn day in the church year, when we acknowledge the reality of His death and the role of humankind in that event. This year, our church will be the host for the Downtown Ecumenical Good Friday service at 12:10p. Special prelude music will begin at 12 noon, with Alan Fauque and Joanna Ellison playing the saxophone-organ duet they played at Hope Lutheran Church's organ dedication concert in February. Russell Milburn will lead a choir which is open to singers from all the churches. Roxanne Fauque will join Alan and Joanna Ellison for additional musical leadership. The Rev. Jay Smith of First Baptist Church will preach.

At 7p, we will hold a Tenebrae service in the Fellowship Hall. This is a service of diminishing light. As the story of the passion is read from scripture, lights are dimmed and candles extinguished, symbolizing the coming of Christ's death and the world's sorrow. Special music will be provided by choir members and by Pat Dickensheets on a handbell solo. (If you are wondering why we will not be in the sanctuary this year, think about Daylight Savings Time, April 22, and the

## Notes from Deacons Meeting

- No receptions were held during the month of February
- There were no requests for a ride to church during the month of February
- A kitchen clean up has been scheduled for Saturday, March 19. A group of Deacon's will meet at 9:00a for the annual cleaning of the kitchen.
- This year, Easter Baskets are scheduled to be delivered on Friday, April 22<sup>nd</sup>. Set up is scheduled to start at 1:00p at the Senior Citizen Center. Sign up sheets will be available soon.
- A tentative date for a "Pie-ty Sunday" is scheduled for Mother's Day, May 9. A pie fellowship will be held between the two services. Members of the congregation will be encouraged to bring a pie to share. Extra pies (slices and full pies) will be auctioned off. This will be a fund-raising event for a recipient still to be determined. More details will follow.

## Notes from March Session Meeting

Session covered planning for a number of events coming up in this busy church season, including Easter and pre-Easter services and meals. See the details of the schedule and content for these events elsewhere in the newsletter. Session and the Deacons will have a joint meeting on April 7.

Session received new a member, Peggy Mussehl. Many already know Peggy as she has already become active in many activities, including hand bells.

Jody gave an excellent overview of her recent CREDO experience. This is a program offered to established pastors to help them inventory their spiritual and life circumstances and develop plans for the future. We were all very interested to hear her enthusiastic feedback on this opportunity to get away and think about how to "tune" one's career and personal priorities.

Debbie Ernst and her financial task team presented the results of a 2008-2009 financial review. Session approved a recommendation about improving how the offerings are handled.

Vacation Bible School will be held in June (see other articles on this subject). Many volunteers are needed, both for food and supplies, and also to help with the actual programs.

Chuck Beck reported on the recent Presbytery meeting. One highlight is that Jody McDevitt is now Vice Moderator of the Presbytery. There are also two ballot issues whose fates are still unknown; one dealing with the proposed new form of government for the church and the other dealing with standards for ordination.

At the end of the meeting, Session responded to a request from Presbytery to discuss "The Spiritual Condition of Our Congregation." Donna Beck will be summarizing our thoughts on several subjects, including community engagement, mission opportunities, congregation strengths, and overall health of the congregation in a letter report to Presbytery.

## Piano Soloist returns for Palm Sunday

Jiyao Li is a student at Mt. Ellis Academy whose piano artistry is amazing. Born in the city of Xi'an, China in 1993, he began playing keyboard at the age of 4 and transitioned to piano when he was 11. In 2008, Li was ranked first in his province and fourth throughout China on keyboard. Now a senior at Mt. Ellis, he studies under Laurel Yost, associate professor of piano at MSU. He played for our 10:30a service on a cold January morning. We are pleased that he is returning to share his musical offering to God with us on April 17 at the 10:30a service. In addition to being an accomplished pianist, Jiyao (pronounced "yeow") is a delightful young man!

## Russell Milburn Selected for La Musica Lirica in Italy this Summer

Russell Milburn, our Worship choir Director, has been selected to take part in La Musica Lirica in Novafeltria, Italy this summer, from June 20 through July 22. Earlier this year, he auditioned in Salt Lake City by singing some of the operatic arias in his own repertoire and was recently informed that he was among those selected. He will take part in the productions of the operas La Cenerentola by Rossini and Rigoletto by Verdi, to be performed at the 12th International Music Festival in Novafeltria. During this five week program Russell will receive intensive Italian classes, voice coaching by teachers from the Rossini Opera Festival of Italy, diction, opera workshops and several additional performance opportunities.



## Rejoice in the Lamb

On Sunday, May 1st, the worship choir at First Presbyterian Church will be joined by four soloists (soprano, alto, tenor, and bass) and many additional singers from the community for a special musical performance. The piece is a creation by Benjamin Britten, entitled Rejoice in the Lamb, with text by Christopher Smart; composed for SATB choir, SATB soloists and organ. The performance (approximately twenty minutes) will be a part of both the 8:30 and the 10:30 services.

Considered a twentieth century choral work of the highest standing, Rejoice in the Lamb encompasses a broad range of styles. While being of a ceremonial nature throughout, the listener can pick out elements of chant, to vocal polyphony, to exciting, intricate rhythms. This special music is being performed in memory of Jerry Crabs.

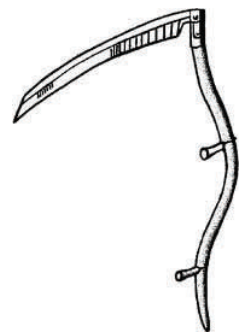
